2019-20 Impact Report

It gives me great pleasure to welcome you to Northampton Saints Foundation Impact Report 2019/20. It has been a tremendous year for the charity where change and challenge has been the theme.

A new Managing Director was introduced in mid-2019, tasked with taking the Foundation to the next level and with that mindset the team has made huge progress. Our Education department has seen a complete revamp. Having launched and made a great start in January 2020 this came to an abrupt halt in March when the pandemic hit. We are grateful for the support of the Wilson Foundation, providers of a significant grant that will act as a catalyst to restart these programmes as children return to mainstream education in September. Our Inclusion programmes have gathered pace, whilst we have seen a real appetite for our new Values programme, the existing programmes have seen demand exceed the space we had and the Foundation took the decision to expand in order to accommodate the young people in need.

We are really pleased to have signed an agreement with Old Northamptonians Rugby Club to base our Engage programme from their site for 2020/21. Our heritage department has been focused on the Heritage Lottery funded Mobbs' Own project, finding out stories of the Mobbs' Own. Whilst some aspects of the project have paused over lockdown the research has continued and the 25 strong volunteer team have maintained excellent progress. The film and brochure produced about their findings make an insightful watch and a powerful read, I would urge you to find these on our website or through the links in this document. The significant and rapid growth across the breadth of the Foundation departments led to another key change and in November we added a Fundraising, Grants and Events Officer to our team, tasked with sourcing the funding required to maintain the existing and support the new programmes. This role has proved vital, both with remodelling the past strategy to funding but mainly driving the change in approach when the pandemic hit, as it became essential that our fundraising was agile and grants focused. Securing several important grant awards through being innovative and creative with fundraising events has stood us in good stead as we navigated a route through Covid-19 and enter a new academic



year on a strong footing.

We are incredibly grateful to the volunteers that support us, a whole network of individuals with skills in the classroom, supporting our staff, supporting our students and helping us grow the Foundation. Whilst the global pandemic has presented an unprecedented set of challenges the Foundation team has ridden the wave and ensured the young people we are determined to support, and heritage we must protect have remained at the forefront of our decisions. Northampton Saints Foundation could not improve the life chances of so many without the unrivalled support of the Northampton Saints family - the rugby club staff, our Ambassadors, many other players that support the cause, but primarily the unwavering support and commitment we receive from our very special corporate partners, supporters and donors. On behalf of the Northampton Saints Foundation and the many young people whose lives you help change, thank you.

Harry has attended workshops, award ceremonies, schools, businesses and shared our message on Instagram live as a Northampton Saints Foundation Ambassador. In 2020 we were honoured to be asked to support another team, TeamAlfie.

In January 2020 we first heard about 6-year-old Saints supporter Alfie, he had been diagnosed with lymphoma and given a 30% chance of survival. We were all so moved by the strength and determination Alfie showed, spending many months in hospital, enduring endless chemotherapies, losing his hair and being in constant pain.

Alfie's favourite player is Courtney Lawes, a lovely friendship has developed, and Courtney has stayed close to Alfie and his family through his journey. We shared Alfie's GoFundMe page and raised awareness of his journey across our channels, many supporters and Saints players reached out to Alfie and his family as they shared #TeamAlfie stories on Twitter. Many messages and videos of support were shared. Tom Wood visited Alfie when he won our raffle for a signed shirt, at this time he was continuing his recovery at home, having rung the end of treatment bell and we were beyond delighted to hear on 6th August 2020 that Alfie's MRI results showed he was cancer free. The pandemic has stopped us bringing Alfie to Franklins Gardens, his ambition is to be a ball boy, and have a beer (alcohol free of course) with Alex Waller, we will make those dreams come true. Northampton Saints Foundation has been in a transformation period over the last 12 months, with rapid change and growth.

The team worked hard to identify and establish our core offer, design a strategy to meet ambition and measure our impact against our mission statement. Our growth has been significant, particularly in our inclusion and heritage work. When the Covid-19 pandemic hit in March 2020, like most charities, we were uncertain of the impact it would have, we are proud to say we were able to stay open and support vulnerable young people who needed our services, probably more than ever through this time. We are grateful to the education and inclusion settings that continued to support us, knowing how vital our service was to their young people. The biggest impact of the pandemic was felt by our education department, with schools closed our remodelled and relaunched education packages focusing on health, character, numeracy and history stopped just two months after they started. The return of mainstream education from September creates an opportunity for us to share these programmes widely and support local schools to deliver a broad and holistic curriculum. Whilst unable to visit local schools our 16+ education programmes reverted to a remote delivery almost overnight, we are delighted with the resilience and flexibility shown by our students to adapt to this change and still receive the very positive outcomes for their courses that they truly deserved. The lesson in adaptability will stand them in good stead as they move on to further education, training, or employment.

We are thankful for a number of people that volunteer their time, donate their services or money across all of our departments – Education, Heritage and Inclusion, you will read about many of their stories in this report, we are very fortunate that there are too many people to individually mention, you all know who you are and from me to all of you, a very personal thank you. Without you we would not be making the progress we are.

Thank you to all of my incredible team that are on this journey with me, each and every one of you plays your part in us achieving the outcomes we do, your drive and passion is unequivocal, we have equally exciting and challenging times ahead.

As we move into 2020/21 academic year with the pandemic still affecting day to day operations and providing challenges, we are determined to stay on our defined path. We will be agile; we will work to find solutions and we will meet the ever-growing need for our services. We will continue to Inspire, Support and Educate.

Our Education department has been completely remodelled for the 2020 calendar year, offering fresh, new and current curriculum content to Inspire, Support and Educate young people and their communities, we are proud to have delivered a variety of innovative and exciting programmes across the 2019-20 academic year.

Delivered throughout a variety of settings, the programmes have used the power of sport and its values to provide inclusive and differentiated theory and practical based sessions.

Values

We launched our brand new Values programme at Coventry Extended Learning Centre. Incorporating both the Northampton Saints Foundation and rugby's own core values offering a holistic approach to promote well-being, with the aim of building character, improving interaction and communication as well as promoting positive self and social behaviours. Throughout sessions that encourage interaction, understanding and personal development, pupils discuss and develop their knowledge and understanding of the core values and how they are applied in and support real life situations.

Sarah Mills, from Coventry City Council, kindly shared her thoughts on our values delivery and said:

"The Foundation's staff have been professional, inspiring, understanding, innovative and supportive in their approach to re-engagement of our young people into investing in their futures. There has been a real 'buzz' from some of our most vulnerable and disengaged pupils. The team have a real passion for their work, and clear understanding of how some pupils find themselves outside of the mainstream setting. They also understand this is not the end of their education but a new beginning for their futures – no-one in the setting is left out, everyone counts."

This positive feedback has led to an expansion of our delivery within this setting, but also encouraged us to enhance our delivery of the values programme moving forward, by affiliating with one of our Foundation partners Boost Trampoline Park for those that can travel to experience the programme. This partnership will enable us to not only provide young people with exciting values delivery but also give access to a highly rated trampoline park for an hours' worth of physical activity and fun.

With thanks to our National Lottery Heritage Fund grant, over 720 young people have accessed the Northampton Saints Franklin's Gardens stadium to take part in a Mobbs' Own Education Day. From across 28 Northamptonshire schools, learners have further explored the history behind our prestigious club and the heroic Saint, Edgar Mobbs and the Mobbs' Own.







The above quote is from a conversation that happened with Claire Jones, the HLF project manager and Ella Bevan, a Trustee of the Northampton Saints Foundation in the early days of the project. It was meant to help set expectations of what we probably would achieve. We believe that we have far exceeded what anyone could have expected.

Myth busting - 278 men belonged to the Mobbs Own, not 263

Originally thought to be called 'Sportsman's Battalion' they were actually known as the Mobbs' Corps or Mobbs' Own.

85 came back, we now know that number is at least 159, possibly more.

Case Studies



Harold Simpson

Harold Simpson who was one of the first officers in the company. We recently, discovered that after the war had ended, he was sent to Ireland to fight in the civil war with the 1st Battalion Northamptonshire Regiment. Harold played cricket for Northamptonshire before the war. We have shared this news with the cricket club.



George Foster who was taken prisoner during the war. We now know what happened when he was captured and that he could have been killed rather than taken as a prisoner of war. There is no record of George sharing this story after the war – he was a well-known local solicitor in Northampton. We found out during the project that one our volunteers had worked for him as her first job.

Our History



Traditionally, the focus of attention has been on the two Saints players who fought with the Mobbs' Own and were killed in battle – one was Edgar Mobbs, the other was Jack Gillam. During the project we established which of the Mobbs' Own were Saints players and as a result, uncovered some forgotten stories:



Sergeant Albert Edwin Luck 15644

Military Medal and bar, 1914-15 Star, British War Medal, Victory Medal, Saint #514

The volunteers have nicknamed Albert the 'Forgotten Saint' – no-one at the Saints had made the connection between Saint #514 on the list of players and Sgt AE Luck in the Mobbs' Own. We were looking for his marriage announcement in the newspaper and we found something entirely different – the match report from his last game for the Saints.

Born in 1895 in Semilong, Albert was the youngest of three children. The family all worked in the boot and shoe industry and lived in Dallington and St James before Albert signed up.

He was just 19 when he went to war. He was wounded in 1916 but went on to win the Military Medal twice in 1917 and 1919 when he was also promoted to Sergeant. He was one of just 5,796 men who won the honour twice – for 'gallantry and devotion to duty under fire'.

On his return he played some 253 times for Saints from 1919 until his retirement in 1928. He played in the pack, mainly at lock with the occasional game at skirmisher (flanker) when carrying an injury. It was Albert who laid the wreath on behalf of the Northamptonshire Regiment, at the ceremony which unveiled the war memorial at Franklin's Gardens in 1922. That memorial is still within the stadium today.

Such was his popularity at the club that when he married in 1926, the committee asked for donations for a present to be made to the secretary. His name is now on the 200-club roll of honour and in pride of place by the No 4 peg in the changing room.

We discovered Albert's story during the week before the Saints were scheduled to play Lyon Olympique Universitaire in the Heineken Champions Cup. It was the first time the Saints had played the French club since 1927. Our research found that Albert Luck had played in that game.

Major-General Sir Russell Gurney

Belgian Order of the Crown, Belgian War Cross, Legion of Honour, Crown of Italy

Russell Gurney played for the Saints nine times in 1911. He is Saint #413. He was the son of Thomas & Annie Gurney. Thomas was the Vicar of St Giles church in Northampton. The couple had two other children John Cedric and Christine. Russell initially joined the Public-School Corps (known as the Pals Battalions). However, due to a shortage of officers, public school & university graduates were encouraged to apply for commissions and eventually the battalion's ranks were depleted. Russell was swiftly gazetted to the 7th as 2nd Lieutenant. He continued to rise through the ranks and throughout his military career was awarded numerous medals and honours – his is our most internationally decorated of the men.

Prior to the war, he was a trainee-chartered accountant for A C Palmer and Co Chartered Accountants in Northampton.

He also, played rugby for East Midlands and according to a report in the Northampton Mercury in 1916, it seems he was responsible for organising the occasional rugby match amongst the men during his time in France.

After the war he stayed in military service, although deemed unfit at the start of World War II, he was still promoted to Major-General in 1943 and became Aide De Camp to King George VI in 1944. He was included in the honours list in 1944 and was awarded a Companion Order of the Bath. He wrote several training manuals, a crime fiction novel with his wife Margaret and "The History of The Northamptonshire Regiment 1732-1934". He has two portraits recorded in the National Portrait gallery. He died in 1947 aged 57.

We have been gifted three books written by members of the 7th Battalion – these will form part of a future exhibition about the Mobbs' Own. Specifically, they are:

The Raising of the 7th (Service) Battalion Northamptonshire Regiment by Captain Guy Paget – this is Paget's own personal copy which is signed by the author and has a letter from Buckingham Palace with a message from the King. Paget was one of the officers who commanded 'D' Company during the war. Gifted by Claire and Tim Jones

Rambling with Rabbits by Henry Grierson – this is Grierson's autobiography where he talks about his time during the war. Grierson joined up with Mobbs in September 1914 and was one of his team of officers whilst Mobbs commanded the Battalion. Gifted by Lis Saunders

History of the Northamptonshire Regiment 1742-1954 by Major Russell Gurney. This is the first of two volumes about the Regiment – it gives Gurney's view of what happened to the 7th during the war. Gifted by donations from the Project volunteers

We organised a trip to France and Belgium to visit the battlefields where the Mobbs' Own fought. This included Loos, the Somme and Passchendaele where Mobbs was killed. Two Military historians, Graham McKechnie and the late Jon Cooksey guided the volunteers on the trip. Many had never visited a battlefield before and very few had experienced being in a trench. We paid our respects to the Mobbs' Own at the Loos Memorial, the evening ceremony at the Menin Gate and at the Mobbs' Cross in Shrewsbury Forest (where the battle of Passchendaele took place). The great-nephew of Edgar Mobbs, also called Edgar, joined us, on is first ever visit to the cross erected in the memory of his great-uncle.

Age 18 Nationality -Nigerian

Samad was first introduced to the Foundation when he came to support a friend through their interview. Samad was due to be joining Northampton College but was unable to do this because he did not have his right to remain in the UK.

The Foundation supported Samad to apply for his Right to remain, which was successful, and he was enrolled onto our HITZ programme and his national insurance number arrived a short while later.

Upon meeting him he was bright, bubbly and excited to be attending HITZ and looking forward to creating a positive future for himself. Samad was extremely happy to be part of the course and really stood out within the enrichment-based sessions.

Samad is extremely proud to be a HITZ student and we are certain he would have become NEET if he did not enrol onto our programme. During his time with us he attended an Army workshop which explored the opportunities they have. He was so engaged by them and really wanted to apply but was extremely disappointed when he was told he would need to live in the country for 3 years before applying.

During his time on HITZ he achieved:

- BTEC Level 1 in Sport
- Functional skills Maths L2
- Functional skills English at L2
- Introduction to coffee and Barista training
- CV & Interview workshop
- Work placement with Bearward engineering

His passion for the Army is still very much alive and I believe that is where he will go in the future. But right now, is going to continue working and is hoping to take Bearwood Engineering up on their offer of Employment /Apprenticeship.

'Understanding how Samad came to this country and knowing there was no certainty about him being able to remain was truly upsetting. When we received the RTR documents and had confirmation from solicitors his face lit up. It was a moving time for everyone involved at the Foundation'

The Engage programme works with students aged between 10-16 to increase confidence and boost self-esteem. The programme has been running since 2015, giving us experience of working with several students with complex needs. Engage uses practical-based activities to empower students to see the positives in everyday life. Engage works with the referrer to develop a progression pathway which is specific for each individual student to ensure we are meeting their full needs. The programme operates under a very high staff-to-student ratio, to ensure we can provide the best support.

Aidan, a 14-year-old with anxiety and slight autism, had very limited social and sporting interactions. He was referred to the ENGAGE programme by his school and parents, this programme works with young people in the area through various sporting and physical activities, focusing on enjoyment and interactions with each other. To begin with Aidan struggled to get involved in the sessions and talk to others, but with very close support form staff and positive reinforcement from the other students, he started to enjoy all the sessions and new activities that he was taking part in. Eventually he started to talk to everyone around him and grew great friendships and skills.

Engage+ uses practical and classroom-based activities to empower students to see the positives in everyday life. All our staff are fully trained and experienced in working with students with educational attainment issues and behavioural problems.


